Volunteers at the Columbia Food Bank have been exceptionally busy since 2010, a reflection of the economic struggles affecting many families and individuals.

The food bank, the second largest in Lancaster County, distributed more than 166 tons of food, providing 331,972 meals to 15,172 people in 7,817 house-holds from 2010 through October 2016, says executive director Danielle Peters.

"Unfortunately, the demand has continued to increase," Peters says. "The number of meals provided has increased 53 percent; the number of people, 42 percent. The number of households needing food assistance has increased by over 500 during the same period."

Of those clients served, 30 percent are 17 and under, 56 percent are ages 18 to 59, and 14 percent are 60 and older, she says.

"It can be a very sensitive issue, to reach out for help. But we are here and we want people to know that," says Peters, adding that the Columbia Food Bank promotes health, nutrition, human dignity and potential.

"Dignity is important. Many people who don't have enough to eat hesitate to ask for assistance. They want to be self-sufficient and do it on their own," she says. "When they see that their children are hungry or they open the cupboard to empty shelves, they realize that they need to do something."
