Miscellaneous - toiletries - if opened, exercise equipment such as treadmills, elipticals, bicycles, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, heaters, anything that contained kerosene or gasoline in it, tires, weapons, gas powered tools, chemical/cleaning supplies and paint/paint thinner.
