Dad's Leftover Turkey Pot Pie

"Turkey pot pie like you have never tasted before. It won't last long"

Ingredients:

2 cups frozen peas and carrots

2 cups frozen green beans

1 cup sliced celery

2/3 cup butter

2/3 cup chopped onion

2/3 cup all-purpose flour

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. ground black pepper

1/2 tsp. celery seed

1/2 tsp. onion powder

1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning

1 3/4 cups chicken broth

1 1/3 cups milk

4 cups cubed cooked turkey meat

4 (9 inch) unbaked pie crust

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F

 Place peas and carrots, green beans, and celery into sauce pan; cover with water, bring to a boil, and simmer over medium

— low heat until celery is tender (about minutes). Drain the vegetables in a colander; set in sink and set aside.

3. Melt butter in a saucepan over medium heat, and cook onion until translucent, about 5 minutes. Stir in 2/3 cup of flour, salt, black pepper, celery seed, onion powder, and Italian seasoning; slowly whisk in the chicken broth and milk until the mixture thickens. Remove from heat; stir the cooked vegetables and turkey meat into the filling until well combined.

4. Fit 2 pie crusts into the bottom of 2 (9 inch) pie dishes. Spoon half the filling into each pie crust, then top each pie with another crust. Pinch and roll the top and bottom together at the edge of each pie to seal, and cut several small slits into the top of the pies with a sharp knife to release steam.

5. Bake in the preheated oven until crusts are golden brown and the filling is bubbly(30-35 minutes). If the crusts are browning too quickly, cover the pies with aluminum foil after about 15 minutes. Cool for 10 minutes before serving.

A DIFFERENT KIND OF WISH LIST

It's no secret that Trinity members make wishes come true! Whenever a request has been made, someone steps forward to help make it a reality. We are grateful for all your generosity. Now we have a different kind of wish list – one that we hope each of you who are able will commit to making happen. We need your time and talents to help with the many things that need to be done around the church on a regular basis. Here are some of the tasks that have been identified that could use YOUR talents and would require a modest amount of commitment and time:

- •Tidying up the sanctuary weekly so that guests and members will enter a church that has been lovingly cared for. This would include discarding old bulletins, making sure the pencils in the pews are sharpened, refilling or replacing the hand sanitizers (we have the supplies for this), collecting communion cups, etc.
- •Changing the sign in front of the church. Coordinating with the Pastor to change the message when needed and publicizing upcoming events.
- •Sign up to care for ONE of the flower beds at the church. This would require weeding, planting new flowers if you choose, mulching the bed and light trimming around it. The church would provide the mulch needed.
- •Update our website and work with the Administrative Assistant to keep it current.
- •Attend to our social media presence 3 or more times weekly. This is something that does not require coming to the church but would need to be discussed regularly with the Pastor to determine what kinds of things should be appearing on the pages.
- Identify visitors, encourage them to sign the guest book, introduce them to the pastor, make sure they receive our gift bag.
- •Contact visitors who have attended worship or other events.

It would be great if several people signed up for these tasks and could share the responsibility!

A Message from PCC

Hartman Center

October 23, 2019

Dear friends of Penn Central Conference,

"Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help." (Ecclesiastes 4:9-10)

Years ago I worked with a very small church in Valparaiso, Indiana. This church had formed intentionally as an African-American presence in a largely white community that had been home to persistent racist behavior and rhetoric. A Lutheran pastor named Michael served the lively and unique church while I was there. Michael had been a world-class trombone player and had a deep appreciation for jazz as well as for the church. We talked about what it might take for the small church to continue having a big impact in that community. In one of our conversations Mike introduced a phrase to me that I've never forgotten. He said, "All of my work is about one thing: creating coalitions of possibility."

In the face of some of the most challenging work a church can do (racial healing in a community) he consistently looked for ways people could work together to bring light and hope, regardless of where they came from. That phrase has continued to inspire me and I thought of it again this past Sunday when I had the blessing of preaching at a combined service of two churches in the Lebanon Association (Redeemer in Hershey and Trinity in Palmyra). Pastors Donte Jones and Tom Caruso shared the liturgy and Redeemer UCC shared its remarkable music. The joyful service demonstrated what more we can do and experience when we do it together, even for just one hour on a Sunday.

Afterward we gathered in the parlor for conversation. One topic was the number of small churches in transition within the Conference. Congregants asked about churches joining forces, sharing pastors, or merging. Numerous churches are doing this already, looking like they did 100 years ago when 2, 3, even 5-point charges were common. However, resistance to this idea nowadays is common too. We

know the reasons why - devotion to our buildings, unwillingness to share a pastor, fear of losing a distinctive identity, fear of being hurt, fear of losing members. The list goes on. All the reasons are understandable. Yet they still emerge out of fear, and not hope. They still speak to closed systems, and not to possibility. They still demonstrate individual identity, rather than a shared sense of being the coalition of God's people.

I believe God is calling us, and has always called us out of a place of fear. God calls us as individuals and as congregations into new ways of being in the world - dynamic ways that will make us stronger and more effective in sharing and living God's Word. God's people, those free of fear, should be the leaders at the art of forming coalitions of possibility. What might this look like in Penn Central Conference?
